The moving of the Patterson mill to Wadesboro and the doubling of the capacity of the mill already here would mean a great deal to Wadesboro. It would add 350 persons to our wage-oarning population, and of course this would mean the spending of theusands of dollars a year with the business men of the town. Every person in the town would receive direct, or indirect, financial benefit from this substantial influx of capital, therefore the matter is certainly of sufficient importance to the welfare of the town to receive serious consi leration at the hands of our business men.

In this connection we will say that in our opinion the principal reason why operatives of the class needed in silk mills are hard to get here is be cause our town has no work for any considerable number of grown men to engage in. If we had furniture facto ries, or wood working factories of any sirt, where men could get steady emproyment, it would not be at all difficutt to materially add a very desirable class of people to our population, and at the same time make it much easier to secure the necessary operatives for such establishments as the silk mill and the Hargrave & Leak skirt manufadtory.

Let us awake to our opportunities and do something along the line indicated, for it is as certain as anything can be that the town will never amount to much unless we have more manu-

factories.
